

Making Negatives and Follow-up Questions



Make the sentence negative.

Ex.: I drink wine.

→ I **don't** drink wine.

Ex.: I don't drink wine.

→ So, **what do you drink?**

Make the sentence negative

Ex.: I drink wine.

 I don't drink wine.

Make the sentence negative:

I get up at 6 o'clock.

I don't get up at 6 o'clock.

Make the sentence negative:

It is raining.

It isn't raining.

Make the sentence negative:

You told me.

You didn't tell me.

Make the sentence negative:

She'll be there.

She won't be there.

Make the sentence negative:

They've understood
everything.

They haven't understood
everything.

Make the sentence negative:

Peter read the book.

Peter didn't read the book.

Make the sentence negative:

I was a really good
student.

I wasn't a really good student.

Make the sentence negative:

He fell and broke his
finger.

He didn't fall and (didn't)
break his finger.

Make the sentence negative:

Their children are playing
in the garden.

Their children aren't playing
in the garden.

Make the sentence negative:

Hemingway wrote this
book.

Hemingway didn't write
this book.

Ask a follow-up question

Ex.: I don't drink wine.

 So, what do you drink?

Ask a follow-up question:

I wasn't at work.

So, where?

So, where were you?

Ask a follow-up question:

Mike doesn't like cooking.

So, what?

So, what does Mike like
(doing)?

Ask a follow-up question:

It didn't happen yesterday.

So, when?

So, when did it happen?

Ask a follow-up question:

They aren't going to Paris
this year.

So, where?

So, where are they going
this year?

Ask a follow-up question:

Anna won't tell her mother.

OK, ... she her father?

OK, will she tell her father?

Ask a follow-up question:

I haven't written many
emails today.

So, how many?

So, how many emails have
you written?

Ask a follow-up question:

I saw nothing.

OK,you hear?

OK, did you hear anything?

Ask a follow-up question:

I don't have to tell him
tomorrow.

So, when?

So, when do you have
to tell him?

Ask a follow-up question:

The children weren't
watching TV.

So, what?

So, what were they doing?

Ask a follow-up question:

She knows about it.

Oh, how long?

Oh, how long has she
known about it?
